DONATIONS TO THE WAVERLEY COMMUNITY MEN'S SHED

From the outset, the kind of funds received at the Shed have to be explained.

At times, we receive money for work or material we have provided a member or the public, this being for work done and/or materials supplied. THIS IS NOT A DONATION AND IS NOT TAX DEDUCTIBLE!!

It is a **CONTRIBUTION** to the ongoing functioning of the Shed.

At some other times, we receive funds with no strings attached, and not for either services or materials. **THIS IS A DONATION**.

The relevance of this distinction is vital in writing out receipts whenever funds are received and have to be understood whenever a receipt is is-

sued as the issue of an incorrect receipt may have significant repercussions to the Shed's financial operations.

When the Shed was established, we were granted Charity status, and after many years of trying, the Shed received DGR (Deductible Gift Recipient) status just before Covid.

DGR status allows the Shed to issue a special receipt for <u>all donations</u> of \$2.00 or more, this receipt is eligible to be used by the donor in seeking a deduction in his/her annual tax return. **BUT IT IS ONLY IN RESPECT OF DONATIONS!!** Issue of the wrong receipt may affect out DGR status and result in us losing that status! **Compliance is vital**.

It is for this reason that there are 2 receipt books!! The word "Donation" <u>MUST NOT</u> be used when a benefit is bestowed upon the person making payment. That is why in the general receipt book we must use the word "Contribution" when a payment is received for work done or materials supplied.

If you have any problems in understanding this explanation, please talk to Rodger Jamieson. Depending on your individual tax position, you can claim a deduction for your eligible donation to receive a tax benefit, so **if you wish to make a donation**, please talk to the Treasurer or indicate at the time you hand over the funds to the Supervisor that you require a Tax Deductible receipt.



RAPID ANTIGEN TESTING IN NSW

As of 1 October 2023, you can no longer register a positive rapid antigen test (RAT) result with Service NSW or collect free RATs at Service NSW locations.

You should stay at home and not visit high risk settings such as aged care facilities and hospitals if you have symptoms.

If you are at higher risk of severe illness speak to your doctor and make a plan about testing and antivirals before you get sick.



WCMS ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 2023 - REPORT

We thank all those who attended the **AGM of WCMS for 2023**, a great turnout.

The President's Report and the Treasurer's Report were presented to the meeting and they were both accepted and carried.

Peter Charlton then presented to the meeting his insight into dividing management and administrative functions between more individuals to reduce the extremely heavy administrative workloads on some members, and a discussion as to the future location and requirements (etc) of the Shed ensued.

There was also extensive discussion as to how training and certification for the use of machines in the future may be introduced.

The financial affairs of the Shed also were discussed and a membership fee commencing in March 2024 of \$100 per year was determined.

The meeting thanked all members of the outgoing Board (elected or co-opted) for their work over the past 12 months.

Under the terms set out in our Constitution, seven (7) Board members are elected for 2 year terms with approximately half of the Board standing down at each AGM. This year **Peter Black**, **Graham Ely**, **Charles Gerrard and Peter Charlton** did not have to retire and stayed on.

David Brem, Peter Ulmer and lan Dawes had served their 2 year terms and had to retire but were eligible for re-election, so there were 3 vacancies for election to the Board. **David Brem** indicated that he didn't wish to stand for re-election.

Nominations were sought, **Peter Ulmer, Ian Dawes and Jeff Silberbach** were elected to be on the Board for 2 year terms.

After the elections, the office bearers were decided by the Board to be as follows:

President: Peter Charlton
Vice President: Peter Black
Secretary: Graham Ely
Treasurer: Charles Gerard

Committee: Peter Ulmer, Ian Dawes and Jeff Silberbach

The meeting resolved that the Board be enabled to co-opt such member it sees fit onto the Committee during the year for specific purposes, and **Brian Sutton, Rodger Jamieson and William Honeyball** were co-opted.

Peter Black is making a number of **planter boxes for Ronald McDonald Homes**, his time is almost completely taken up by this project.




Ray Tajer has made a *timber light base* using a very imaginative design and a high degree of skill (left).

WHAT THE HECK IS A MOXON VICE?

The story title is something many of you in the Shed asked me when I was making it.

"Moxon vice ... I've never heard of it".

To be honest nor had I until Frank Tucker (ex -WCMS Shedder and now residing at a Lake Macquarie Boat Building Shed) mentioned it to me. He knew I was about to buy a new vice and said why not build one.







He sent me pictures and dimensions of his effort and also explained the benefits of this vice over the more conventional units with a central screw spindle and handle. And so I built one.

I discovered that Joseph Moxon's (1627-1691) twin-screw handle vice was first described and illustrated in his 17th-century book "The Art of Joinery". At that time, it was considered a genius device as the portable Moxon vice holds work above the standard height of a workbench and allows work to slip between the clamping jaws.

And unlike conventional vices, it allows the use of asymmetrical pieces of wood without supporting blocks.

BRAINFREEZE "OOPS!"

THE HMAS SYDNEY II MEMORIAL, GERALDTON, W.A.

The light cruiser HMAS Sydney II sank after a battle with the German auxiliary cruiser HSK Kormoran on 19th November 1941, with no survivors of the 645 crew aboard, the largest naval tragedy in Australian history.






On my recent visit to Geraldton, I visited the memorial erected to honour the 645 sailors who never came home.

The memorial is on a hill overlooking Geraldton and is made up of four major elements:



- 1. a stele, based on the ship's prow;
- 2. a granite wall listing the ship's company;










4. a dome made up of 645 stainless steel seagulls representing the souls of the lost sailors. An eternal flame is lit in the sea lanterns overhead.

The Pool of Remembrance includes a map of the coast, the coordinates of the location of the wreck and a sole seagull angled in the wreck's direction.







FALLS PREVENTION - Dizziness

Dizziness can increase the risk of falling by causing balance problems, unsteadiness and muscle weakness. Dizziness can also cause a lack of awareness of hazards and increases the chances of an injury from a fall.

There are many causes and there are things that can be done to help manage dizziness.

What are some of the causes?

- Medical conditions affecting blood pressure, nerves, or heart
- Medications
- Inner ear problems
- Low blood sugar
- Lack of air or breathing problems
- Anxiety
- Vision problems
- Motion sickness

Tell your doctor about your symptoms:

- Describe your dizziness and what it feels like.
- Did it first start suddenly or gradually?
- How often does it happen?
- How long does it last?
- What makes it worse?
- What makes it better?

Seek immediate medical attention if you experience dizziness with any of the following:

- Headache
- Blurred vision
- Chest pain
- Hearing loss
- Speech problems
- Leg or arm weakness
- Numbness or tingling
- Heart rate problems
- Shortness of breath
- Loss of consciousness

SHEDDER'S COOKBOOK



How often does your other (better) half complain that you don't support her by doing some of the cooking? Let's hope not too often.

We are reminded that you don't have to be a great cook (you heard about the army joke when the sergeant asked "Who called the cook a bastard? ...") but it is good to tempt fate at times and to prove victorious.

WHITE CHRIST-MESS:

This dessert couldn't be simpler to make. Whip up some cream and then layer together with store-bought meringue, fresh raspberries, glace cherries and Raffaello truffles. It's so easy to put together but creates a stunning effect when presented in a trifle bowl. It's the perfect Christmas dessert!

Ingredients

- 900ml thickened cream
- 250g fresh raspberries
- 200g packet glace cherries, coarsely chopped
- 100g packet meringue nests
- 230g packet Ferrero Confetteria
- Raffaello truffles, unwrapped

Method Step 1

Use electric beaters to beat the cream in a bowl until soft peaks form. Place half the raspberries in a small bowl and crush with a fork. Use a spatula to fold the raspberries and one-quarter of the glace cherries into the cream until just combined. Crumble 4 meringues and 6 Raffaellos over the cream mixture. Use a spatula to fold the meringue and Raffaellos into the cream mixture until just combined.

Step 2

Spoon one-third of the cream mixture into a 2L (8 cup) serving bowl. Scatter over one-third of the remaining raspberries and glace cherries. Crumble over 2 meringues. Scatter over 6 Raf-



faellos. Add half of the remaining cream mixture then top with half the remaining raspberries and glace cherries. Crumble over 2 meringues and scatter over 6 Raffaellos.

Step 3

Cut remaining meringues and Raffaellos in half. Top Christ-mess with the remaining cream mixture, raspberries, glace cherries, meringues and Raffaellos.
