Would you be willing to help a stranger by performing CPR (heart compressions) in those vital first minutes before paramedics arrive? The sooner a person experiencing cardiac arrest gets CPR, the bet-

ter their chances of survival

NSW Ambulance has partnered with GoodSAM, a program that empowers members of the community to respond quickly when someone nearby goes into cardiac arrest.

WORKING WITH CHILDREN CHECK RENEWALS

Working with Children Checks are valid for 5 years and is required whenever you have interaction with children/minors of any age. If your WWCC expires soon, you can now save time by renewing it online.

To help verify your identity, you'll be asked to scan your face using the camera on your phone, tablet or computer. Your scan will then be matched with the photo on your NSW Driver Licence or NSW Photo Card.

Scans will be permanently deleted after the check has been completed.

Alternatively, if you prefer, **you can still renew in-person** with your identity documents at a Service NSW centre.

Mateship is an important pillar of every Men's Shed – first and foremost the shed is a place for men to knock about with a group of like-minded mates.

SURFACE RUST REMOVAL

Following a recent question from a Member at the Shed, I recommend using lanolin on infrequently used tools to limit corrosion.

I have applied liquid lanolin to my tools over several decades and most are still in good order. Lanolin is a natural product which is produced as a by-product of the refinement of wool. So, not only does it protect from corrosion, it is also good for dry skin.

Anyway, there are a number of brands including *Lan-ox* and *Lanotec* and it comes in either a pressure pack can or a pump spray bottle.

Typically, I spray it on and then spread it with a small piece of cloth. It is quite liquid when applied but it tends to dry over night or over a few days to a soft waxy coating.

If need be, it can be easily removed using a cloth or paper towel and a little bit of mineral turpentine.

It is great for those chisels, planes, drills and sundry hand tools, but do not use it on files as it will clog them up and annoy you.

NONOTIVE ARMIN



Give those presently surface rusted tools a good brisk rub with a stiff wire brush to remove some rust before you wipe on the lanolin.

Apply a generous coating (not so much that it drips off). Let tools air dry a bit over night or for a few days and then you can toss them back in the old tool box. Give lanolin a go so the grand-children can use the tools after you have departed.

RE-PURPOSING A BROKEN SURF LEASH

However annoying it is for surfers to break and bin a board leash, it's a lucky break for the local body surfers in search of decent fin leashes to save \$25 a pair - and countless fish from micro plastic pollution.

A solid file is all you need to remove the bolt from the swivel, a hammer and nail to punch it out.

Grab some strong chord and tie a few handy knots - by all means show off your bowline and figure of eight on the bight, but a couple of double grannies would do

Be sure to keep the knots away from discomforting the heel, and bingo - surf's up ..

If you find them, and are in doubt, bring 'em to the Shed and watch them fly off the shelves at our November Show!!


Harry Jacobs is making his famous *charcuterie boards* in preparation for the November Show (above)



Peter Charlton (left) finally found some time to do some *turning*. Between looking for a new home for the Shed and Shed management issues, this doesn't happen too often!




Craig Rubenstein is making a **set of shelves.** As we have become accustomed, Craig uses beautiful (and often exotic) timbers for projects (right)

Frank Fay is making wooden spatulas to complement the spoons he had made previously (left).






